Journals don't typically have a policy about the qualifications of the author. If the work is interesting, well-written, thorough, and contributes something valuable and original, it should pass peer-review and get published anywhere. That said, there are journals that make a point of highlighting student work (even undergraduates) and you might be more successful in getting published if you target these.


## **The Unfamiliar: An anthropological journal (open access)**

Anthropology Now is an independent initiative committed to claiming a public voice for anthropology. Set up as a way to share anthropology with the 'well-informed reader' it accepts shorter submissions (3500-4000 words) and aims at being jargon-free with vivid ethnographic narratives. They accept student work of various sorts for the website as well (fieldnotes, findings, reviews, poetry, art, etc.). AnthroZine is specifically for undergrads to "Our vision of Anthro/Zine is to encourage student creativity through anthropology by publishing works from college students and recent grads that explores their individual encounter with our discipline."

**Reinvention is an undergrad journal** that will take articles from any discipline, which is quite unusual (by Univ Warwick/Monash Univ.)

We can publish work via the student research collection on RADAR if it is first class and repurposed from an assignment into a publication format (e.g. short talk to camera, poster, blog post, etc) . This gives students a permanent record for the CV and you keep the copyright (we use a creative commons license).
