What is Think Human Festival?

Think Human Festival showcases research and teaching in the Humanities and Social Sciences at Brookes and demonstrates the relevance of these disciplines to our everyday lives as human beings.

Think Human events are free, open to all and designed to entertain, engage and inspire our diverse communities by communicating our research and teaching through debate, dance, film, theatre, comedy and interactive exhibitions.

Think Human 2020 developed on the success of our 2018 festival and evolved to focus on collaborating across the University to develop and deliver interdisciplinary events. The 2020 festival prioritised performance led events and off campus events held in community venues across the city. The THF2020 programme of 35 events ran across two weeks, delivering a programme for school groups during the second week. Over 2,000 people attended THF2020 events and over 150 secondary school students attended the second week.







We invited Grammy award winner Andrew Scheps to join our interdisciplinary panel on conveying emotions in songwriting and production.

What's next?

Oxford Brookes Humanities & Social Sciences colleagues are heavily invested in public engagement and ownership of this activity has embedded further through the planning, development and delivery of Think Human 2018 and Think Human 2020. Discussions with Faculty senior management following THF2020 have helped envision the purpose and remit of Think Human beyond the idea of a biannual programme of events. Think Human is now being thought of as a brand for HSS public engagement carried out in the spirit of building and evolving mutually beneficial relationships with community partners and schools.

This new outlook for Think Human focuses on an ongoing programme of HSS research and teaching based content cocreated with local partners and collaborators to better meet the needs of the communities we serve. Future iterations of Think Human Festival will therefore be viewed as a showcase of our Faculty's ongoing public engagement relationships and activities in the community.




















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
